


Wick St Fergus Church of Scotland

Welcome to July you lovely people! Now some of you may be wondering, "Why is a Presbyterian minister being so jovial at the beginning of a newsletter?" Well, I'll tell you. I am writing this towards the end of May. It is also the beginning of a fundraising initiative I undertook to raise funds and awareness for two causes; Medicins Sans Frontieres and Caithness and Sutherland Women's Aid. I mentioned this last month. I have had some interesting reactions and responses to this initiative. They have ranged from some incredible acts of generosity by the people of Wick to the reaction of the cynic who says, "What is the point of doing this for these charities in particular? The problems of this world are so great that there is little point in doing something." That, of course, lets people off the hook – or so they think. And when people question the two charities I generally respond by asking, "Well what are you doing to help or to raise funds or awareness of a cause nearest to your heart?"

As I said last month, doing nothing is not an option. If you are worried about problems at home, get involved for goodness sake! Moaning about a problem is not enough. It's a bit like realising that one is on the wrong train and so one runs along the corridor in the opposite direction. It's ultimately futile. And if one thinks that responding to problems is futile I would remind them of the story of the man walking along Reiss Beach where he sees a small boy throwing washed up starfish back into the water. There were thousands of them! The man went up to the chiel and asked him, "Why are you doing this? There are thousands of them. What difference are you making?" To this the boy responds by picking up a starfish, throwing it into the water and he says to the man, "I just made a difference to that starfish".

We strongly believe at Wick St Fergus in making a difference, even if our act seems futile. We refuse to remain cynical about human nature, believing that there is inherent dignity in humanity and that because we are made in the image of God and because God's purpose for us is to be shaped into the likeness of Jesus, we therefore are more interested in original GOODNESS rather than original SIN. People are more than simply a collection of symptoms of some weird infection, worthy only of suspicion. Instead we have all been endowed with the potential for good. What is important is that we choose to exercise this radical view of human nature. Those who view individuals or people groups with suspicion really do not represent the spirit of Christ in any way that is worth speaking of. But if one views people as beings with potential, even if that potential is occasionally well hidden, then we realise that we are sharing God's view.

In Matthew 25 we read that so close to us is Jesus of Nazareth that he views us as his sisters and brothers, as his partners if you will in the care of his world and its inhabitants as well as the ecosystems. James 1:27 says that pure religion consists in care for the vulnerable and not participating in the cynical world view. Indeed, James views this as such a danger that he speaks of warning that we need to remain unstained by it, so insidious is it. And look for a moment at the people Jesus chose to be part of his inner circle. He had two bad-asses like James and John, a terrorist like Simon the Zealot, a violent man like Simon Peter, a tax cheat like Matthew. He ate and drank with those who had been cast aside by those who thought that they were something. He saw in others things that no one else did. That is what we believe at Wick St Fergus, that everyone has potential, that everyone has the potential to make a difference for good, that no act, if it is done with great love, is futile. If this is the kind of approach which interests you then come and see us sometime. You know where we are.


