


Wick St Fergus Church of Scotland

Welcome to June's edition of our newsletter. By the time you read this the 2017 General Assembly of the Church of Scotland will be a fond, distant memory. Actually, I am trying to put a positive spin on it. Sometimes it can be as exciting as watching paint dry. The Mound has no air conditioning in the Assembly Hall and so keeping awake is a major achievement in itself. I was sitting in the Assembly Hall last year. Next to me sat a former moderator and on my other side sat another old friend. My phone, which was on silent, began to vibrate just as I felt two sets of elbows digging into my sides. My friends suggested that I wake up and stop snoring.

I went out of the hall to answer my phone only to find that it was my sister calling me. I asked her what the matter was. She said that she was watching the live feed from the Assembly online and that the camera focussed on me having a kip. Then an email came in from a friend in the good old US of A suggesting the same thing. But seriously, at the Assembly we get to deal with important things. This year several important issues will be discussed (or will have been discussed by the time you read this). There is no doubt that as a Church we need to change the way that we do things if we are to move beyond survival into growth.

Change can be painful but we must grasp the nettle on this. There is no point trying to deal with 21st century issues using 17th century methods or structures. Secondly, the issue of Palestine/Israel will come up. This will involve raising issues of justice and peace and how we deal with historic/systematic injustice in our world. As Martin Luther King once put it, whoever remains silent in the face of injustice has chosen the side of the oppressor. Thirdly, the issue of human sexuality and its implications for the Church will inevitably be raised and as usual more heat than light will be created. Unless we find a positive and Christlike way through these issues then anything that we have to say to the world will be muted.

For example, we can't expect to be taken seriously here in the west on issues of human rights if we continue to prop up abusive regimes such as Saudi Arabia. In the Sermon on the Mount Jesus said: *Blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called the children of God.* There is a credibility gap between what the Church says about peace and what the Church does in response to conflict both foreign and domestic. And unless we learn to live at peace with ourselves then nobody will ever listen to us. And why should they? George Macleod, founder of The Iona Community once wrote: *How can a Church that is divided represent a God who is one?* As in the person of God, so the Church is called to represent unity expressed in diversity. Ours is a table where all are welcome, where all have value, where the contributions of all are respected and where the love that heals the broken heart is found. Our true hope is built on the foundation of one who called the most unlikely of people into his intimate company.

None of us are perfect. Many of us are damaged. We express our frailty in the unlikeliest of ways. But we come to one who lived among us as one of us and who took our frailty to himself. He is called the Prince of Peace in the Old Testament book of the prophet Isaiah. I can honestly say, as someone who has lived with depression for some years, that whenever I have reached my most melancholic moments, I have found someone standing beside me who knows by experience what our lives are like. Jesus, the joiner of Nazareth, walks with us as a fellow traveller through this life. He lifts us up, he sustains and he never turns away anyone who calls out to him. If you want to know more, come and see us sometime. You know where we are.





CHAT is a campaign group dedicated to driving improvements in local healthcare services across Caithness. We are fighting for a safer service within all our health services in Caithness. We have the 100 mile helper bags almost ready to launch which will help mums in labour, parents with sick kids or anyone who has had to rush away from home in an emergency situation. We continue to gather lots of requests about various health areas to strengthen our campaign. We have already been to Holyrood but are now preparing for our postcard launch again heading for parliament. We are considering the options of getting an independent report done on woman's health which is very costly.

Monday 24th April

Our leader for this meeting was Mrs. Janet McDonald who, after our usual brief opening service introduced our guest for the evening Mrs. Doreen Leith who leads the "Wick Voices Section" of The Wick Society. The inspiration for this section came from the Johnston Collection which tells a pictorial story of our local community and it was considered time to record local voices telling local stories. Doreen took us on a wonderful journey illustrated with Johnston images while we listened to a range of recordings from George Bethune talking about the Duke of Kent's crash on Scaraben, our own Kathlyn Harper's recording memories of a wartime bombing, Anne Dunnett on her love of tennis, Anne Mackay on Wick Post Office and other recollections of a time gone by. This was a fascinating evening, well done to our Wick Society for this initiative, we were told that there are 57 recordings available on The Wick Society's website, well worth a visit. After a hearty vote of thanks tea was served.

May 8

Guild members met at the Lifeboat Station at Wick harbour, where they were given an in-depth insight into the running of the lifeboats around our coasts by coxswain Ian Cormack. The RNLI receives no government funding and is totally reliant on donations from the public to meet the 172 million pounds per annum needed for GB & N Ireland. It costs £120,000 per year to keep the Wick boat afloat. A volunteer needs at least 3 years' training before he/ she becomes a full member of the crew and a complete kit cost around £500 per person. Guild members have willingly taken up a special collection for the local lifeboat.
